- Brevard County Public Schools continue to offer meals for all children up to 18 years old at various food distribution sites through December 31.

- The county has partnered with the Children's Hunger Project to distribute 40,833 weekend meals to date
- Brevard County's "Pop up Pantry" feeding operation has distributed 2.07 million meals to date. From 10/6 - 10/13, served 2,780 cars and 26 walk-ups for a total 2,993 families

State/National Updates

- [The CDC has an new webpage that features new ways of trick or treating and other Halloween activities.](#) These include:
 - When trick or treating or participating in other Halloween activities with people outside your household, wear a mask. You can make it fun by making your mask part of your costume, but when it comes to slowing the spread of COVID-19, a costume mask is not a substitute for a cloth mask. Also, do not wear a costume mask over a cloth mask. It can make breathing more difficult.
 - If you're heading out to trick-or-treat this year, or planning to put candy out for trick-or-treaters, remember to avoid direct contact with trick-or-treaters and give treats away outdoors if possible. Set up a station with individually bagged treats for kids to take, wash hands before handling treats, and wear a mask.
 - If you're planning to participate in activities like decorating and carving pumpkins; visiting an orchard, forest or corn maze; attending an outdoor scavenger hunt; or hosting an outdoor costume party, remember to wear a mask, stay at least 6 feet from others who do not live with you, and wash your hands frequently.
- The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) have issued an update to [CMS Memo QSO-20-38-NH](#) to allow nursing homes to use either the state or federal published county positivity rates to determine the frequency of routine staff testing.
